Email <u>graniannie@hotmail.com</u> We're coming to the end of the Church's year and the cooler weather has settled in, even here in Cyprus. The clocks have changed and November is now upon us. For those of us from the Northern Hemisphere winter approaches and our thoughts (and those of the shopkeepers) turn towards Christmas.

But before that, during November, we have a period of Remembrance., which is then followed by a period of Reflection in Advent as we wait and reflect on the meaning of the coming season of Christmas.

Traditionally in the Church, **All Saintstide** (or All Hallowstide as it would have been called in times past) is a three-day season, or *triduum*, matching the more well-known Easter Triduum of the evening of Maundy Thursday to Easter Day.

All Saintstide comprises **All Saints' Eve** (Halloween), **All Saints' Day** (All Hallows') and **All Souls' Day**, which last from October 31 to November 2 annually.

In addition to this ancient tradition, in modern times, following the carnage of the First World War and subsequent conflicts,

**Remembrance Sunday**, the Sunday closest to the 11th November, has been added to this season of remembrance.

So **All Saintstide** is a time to remember the dead, including martyrs, saints, and all faithful departed Christians.



Here in St Andrew's it has been the tradition over the last number of years to remember all those whom we have loved and lost at a special service of remembrance on All Souls' Day. 2nd November. This year's service took place on Friday 2nd November. At the service we gave thanks for the deceased, recently as well as in the past.

All Saints' Day this year was observed on the Sunday nearest the 1st November which this year was Sunday 4th November. Fr Edward Jervis was the celebrant and preacher at the 10:30am service on that day.

Remembrance Sunday, 11th November, this year marks the 100th anniversary of the end of hostilities in the First World War. This will be marked by an Act of Remembrance in St Andrew's at the 10:30am Holy Communion Service, and will be followed by a Service of Remembrance at the British Cemetery in Kyrenia starting at 12:30pm.



On the 18th November the Rev'd Mike will be away and so we will be delighted to welcome back at the 10:30am service the Rev'd Justin Arnott, Curate at St Paul's Cathedral. Nicosia which is the Mother Church of our part of the Diocese.

Sunday 2nd December could be called "New Year's Day" in the Church's calendar since it marks the start of Advent, which is itself the first season of the Church's year. From that day the colour on the church altar, lectern and the priests' stole changes to purple, the same colour as in Lent, which indicates that Advent is a time of reflection, penitence and preparation for the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ which we celebrate at Christmas. Each Sunday a candle will be lit on the Advent wreath which comprises

three purple, one rose and one white candle. The purple candles match the purple of the altar hangings and the white candle is lit on Christmas Eve at the first Eucharist of Christmas (Midnight Mass). The rosecoloured candle is lit on the Third Sunday of Advent, known as *Gaudete Sunday* from the Latin word meaning "to rejoice": it is also from the first line of the traditional entrance prayer (called the Introit) for the Service of the third Sunday of Advent. It represents a pause from the penitential spirit of Advent.

# On **Sunday 23rd December** we will have a change to the usual

Sunday service pattern in St. Andrew's. On that day there will be a celebration of Holy



Communion at 8:00am but the **10:30am** service will be cancelled. At **4:30pm** we will hold our Carols by Candlelight service, sometimes known as Nine Lessons and Carols. This popular service is surely the time when for most of us in the church Christmas could be said to begin, so please do come along, bring your friends and neighbours and sing all those popular Christmas carols which we know and love, and listen to



the well-known story of the birth of Jesus from the Scriptures.

On Christmas Eve, Monday 24th December, we will celebrate the First Communion of Christmas (Midnight Mass) at 11:30pm followed by the Festal Eucharist for Christmas Day at 10:30am. We will be honoured to have Bishop Michael celebrate and preach at both of these services.

All in all a busy time for us liturgically but we can rejoice that, in spite of all the difficulties we have been through in the past year and the continued uncertainty which we are experiencing as regards the appointment of a new Chaplain, worship not only continues but thrives in St Andrew's. In my former parish church of St Peter in Drogheda, Ireland, a small history book was published which contained the following words from a previous incumbent of that parish:

"Long may our well-loved Church remain as the centre of the spiritual life of the Parish – long may our people meet together in fellowship and common faith - long



may the prayers and praises of our faithful people ascend to the Throne of Grace - long may they join with the blessed company of all faithful people in proclaiming the goodness of the Lord in the land of the living."

To which all of us in St Andrew's can surely say **Amen**.

Sharon Gechure and Lynda Hillard. After their Confirmation they were very warmly welcomed by all present. Afterwards a "finger food" buffet was served in the hall.

#### The Kurban Bayram Collection

The Kurban Bayram collection made by St. Andrew's finally closed on 31st October. A total of **£500** was raised and sincere thanks go to all who donated so generously.



Sandy Oram and the Rev'd Mike visited the Special School in Karakum and were graciously received by the Principal, **Ms Layla Usta**. Layla was humbled and delighted with the offer of funding and, when asked if there was any specific project to which the funds could contribute, showed us

a partition wall in the Hall of the school which was in a dangerous condition. There was a real fear that glass in the partition could be broken due to rotten woodwork and that this could potentially cause serious injury. She had recently received a quotation for the work from a local builder who had himself generously offered to do the work for half-price, but following the recent economic problems in the TRNC the balance was unavailable. The St. Andrew's collection will allow this work to be completed and make the area safe for the young people.

# WHAT WOULD JESUS DO IN 2018?

I've been sitting on this post for over six months trying to decide whether to post it. It's out of my comfort zone and makes me feel nervous, and I've deleted it and rewritten it many times. But sometimes it's important to be open about what you stand for and I have some things I want to say about my faith and the world right now.

I've posted about what I believe before, and what it means to me to be a Christian, a follower of Jesus, but I want to be really honest with you about my personal journey and where I am at today.

I was a Christian teenager in the 90's, which means I grew up during the WWJD movement. The acronym stood for "What Would Jesus

Do?" and the idea behind it was to encourage Christians to ask themselves this throughout the day, and model every action on Jesus himself.

Interestingly enough, as a Christian teenager, I actually missed the entire point, and failed a lot at the very heart of who Jesus is. I am a rule lover, I always have been, so I did pretty great at "morality" and doing my best not to do anything "wrong". What I completely messed up at, was showing grace, love and forgiveness, and I ended up being a



self righteous judgmental jerk. Does this sound at all familiar to anyone?

Lately I'm seeing Christianity being blamed for a lot of things, and similarly a lot of people claiming their hateful thoughts and actions are Christian. And I am becoming concerned. In fact I'm a little horrified.

Jesus preached forgiveness of sins, and love that covers all. He was a perfect model for being kind and compassionate. He spent his time with members of society who were rejected and considered undesirable or worthless. He showed them love and encouraged them to follow him and leave their old lives behind. He was infinitely inclusive and full of patience. He forgave and he was merciful. He was non-violent and lacked any hate. He did not force anyone to follow him - he gave them the option. He did not tow the line – he challenged the status quo. He was hated by the leaders of the day for his radical

teachings. And he sacrificed, giving his very life as atonement for anyone who will take it.

And as a Christian, THIS is what I should be trying to emulate in my own life.

So here I am in 2018 and I am asking myself that question again, and again and again: What would Jesus do?

And this time, I know the answer begins and ends with the love of Jesus. I have already made the mistake of misunderstanding what it means to be a Christian and I never want to go back. I am doubling down on reading Jesus' words. I am doubling down on praying for God to show me what more I can do. For strength to do better than yesterday. I am doubling down on holding myself accountable to the example of Jesus every day. I will give more. I will love more. And if I stumble, I will get back up and try again tomorrow. This is where I stand.

Whoever you are reading this, you are welcome here. I promise you kindness and friendship. When I say I am a Christian I am not describing a culturally conservative personally identity. I am telling you that I am an imperfect person fully aware of my short comings and trying to follow Jesus' loving example every day.

And on the flip side I am hoping that when you see someone using the name of Jesus or Christianity as their excuse for thinking or doing something terrible, that you will remember this post.

#### All Saintstide/Hallowtide

#### The History

The Christian attitude towards the death of martyrs is first exemplified in the New Testament, which records that after the beheading of St. John the Baptist, his disciples respectfully buried him. Stephen was likewise "given a Christian burial by his fellow-Christians after he had been stoned to death by a mob." The theologian Herman Heuser writes that in the early Church, the feast days of the martyrs were local observances, with churches being built on those sites where their blood was shed. Frances Stewart Mossier explains that this changed during the persecution of Christians in the Roman Empire, saying that: *This* arrangement worked very well at first, but soon there were more martyrs than there were days in the year, and so one day was set apart in honour of them all, and called All Saints' Day. This took place about the year AD 610 and the day on which the festival first occurred was 1st May, and it was not until two hundred years after that it was changed to 1 Nov, the day we now observe. The Christians of those times were in the habit of spending the night before All Saints' Day in thinking over the good and helpful lives of those in whose honour the day was kept and in praying that they might be like them. Services were held in the churches, and candles and incense burned before the pictures and statues of the saints. It was to them one of the holiest, most significant days of all the year.

Following the establishment of All Hallows' Day and its vigil, All Hallows' Eve in the 8th century, Odilo of Cluny popularised the day to pray for All Souls, forming the third day of the triduum of All Hallowtide. The octave of All Hallowtide, lasting eight days was established by Pope Sixtus IV in 1430 for the whole Western Church. The octave, however was eliminated in the 1955 reforms of the Catholic Church, although it continues to be observed by many Anglicans. In the United Kingdom, the Church of England, mother church of the Anglican Communion, extended All Saints-tide to include Remembrance Sunday in the 20th century.



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
