As some of you may know, Janet and I have been fortunate enough to get a few days away and so this is being written during a trip to Turkey.

We initially spent some time in beautiful Cappadocia. Those who have visited there will know of the strange, ethereal landscape known as the “fairy chimneys”, and we were very lucky indeed to be able to take a hot air balloon trip to see these.

As we came in to land in our balloon we could see many others which had landed before us. Laid out on the ground those balloons, which in the air were so huge, and which when full of hot air could lift a basket loaded with people, were nothing more than a long flat strip of material which had been folded over for easy storage.

You might wonder why Michael is writing a travelogue for this issue of the parish magazine, taking it as proof that he has finally cracked up!

As we approach the season of Pentecost, the time in the church’s year when we remember the coming of the gift of the Holy Spirit, those balloons reminded me that the Spirit is sometimes referred to in terms of “air” or “wind”. Indeed, the Spirit first came upon the disciples in the form of tongues of flame and wind as we read in Acts 2:1-4:

“When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on

each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability.”

Am I being too fanciful in thinking that churches without the Holy Spirit are like those deflated balloons which we saw? They still bore their pretty colours but were essentially lifeless. But if filled with the fire and wind of the Spirit, like the balloons those churches could become mighty agents for God’s kingdom in this world, lifting ordinary people to extraordinary heights.

God the Holy Spirit,
come in power and bring new life to St. Andrew’s;
renew us in love and service,
and enable us to be faithful to our Lord Jesus Christ.

There will also be plenty of food stalls with cuisine from different parts of the world reflecting the cultural diversity of London! Bishop of London Sarah Mullally DBE, said: "This is a wonderful opportunity for Christians to gather together in an iconic part of our great city to worship Christ, to seek his will and to pray for his kingdom to come. It was humbling to join the huge numbers that assembled at the Cathedral last year. I look forward to seeing what God will do in the lives of many through the fun and fellowship in Trafalgar Square this year."

As a regular 'swallow' I returned to Kyrenia for 'Music Week' and for the first time, to sing as a member of the choir.

Following a full wee of daily rehearsals under the direction of the Director of Music, Earl Moffitt and Principal Guest, Dr Joe McKee, Friday's 'Music Night' was upon us.

It was a wonderful evening of varied music. The church was full and it was clear that the audience enjoyed themselves. The choir sang four pieces, and there were solos by other talented musicians including a trumpeter (Paul Shaw), a flautist (Richard Dobbs), a tenor (Alan Carling) and two sopranos (Sue Carling and Rae

Tilly). The Everly Brothers (Reverend Mike Graham and Maxene Shaller) were appropriately 'lovey dovey' s they swayed to the music and sang 'Dream'. Diana Peek delighted us with her rendition of John Betjeman's poem, 'The Diary of a Church Mouse' too.

Music Week concluded with a Choral Eucharist on Sunday 12th May. Bishop Michael Lewis (accompanied by his wife) attended as Celebrant and Preacher, and once again the choir enjoyed singing several pieces during the service. Clear direction was given to us by Earl Moffitt, and we were expertly accompanied by Dr McKee.

As I sat down to write this article later that day, I asked myself, Was it worth it? Would I do it again? Without reservation the answer is a firm 'yes'. The week has brought musicians together from around the world with a common purpose to practice and perform together and to enrich the lives of others as well as our own.

The passion for the task and commitment was obvious. New friendships were made and others strengthened. It was a wonderful way to bring members of the community together in the simple but lovely surroundings of St Andrew's Church.

I am very aware that 'Music Week' takes a lot of organizing behind the scenes and many people also give up their time to help in non-musical ways eg. typing the programme, organising refreshments, clearing up, and so on.

NO ABIDING CITY



“Surprising stories of the Christian presence and encounter in the Middle East”.

The Bishop of Truro’s recent report highlighting the plight of Christians in some parts of the world drew a good audience to Christ Church, Cheltenham on 8th May as part of the Christian Arts Festival. The Rt Revd Michael Lewis, Bishop of Cyprus and the Gulf and Primate designate of the Province of Jerusalem and the Middle East, had taken his title for the talk No Abiding City from Hebrews 13 v 14.

On behalf of the festival trustees Jenny and John Worton-Griffiths who attend St Andrew’s Church, one of the churches in the Diocese. invited Bishop Michael to speak at the Festival where he was introduced by Revd Nick Davies of St Phillip and St James, Leckhampton.

Bishop Michael began by explaining the geography of the Levant (near east), the Middle East, Egypt and North Africa. He highlighted two narratives: Firstly those areas and countries where it is very difficult to worship and where often today Christians are persecuted. He also stressed that Christians and churches were present in these places long before the start of the Muslim faith. Travelling around the Diocese from Yemen in the south up to Iraq in the North is difficult during these times of strife but every effort is made to continue support for the work there.

The second narrative is one of Christian growth and encouragement. Much of his Diocese covers countries of the Gulf where Christian immigrant workers are welcomed, needed and often far outnumber citizens by more than 6:1. The rulers of these countries have facilitated the building and expansion of churches, albeit within carefully controlled locations and regulation. Over any weekend, Friday, the rest day, through to Sunday 10-20,000 worshippers pass through each church compound.

The Diocese has continued to support and invest in the eye clinic in the St George's Church Aden compound, so important to the Yemeni community. The clinic is run in the name of the Church by committed Muslim doctors and nurses. Bishop Michael has a real passion for St George's Church, Baghdad spending Holy Week there for the last four years. Under the leadership of an Iraqi priest, ordained by Bishop Michael, a clinic, kindergarten and infant school are growing within the compound. Arab parents are so pleased to have their children attend this Christian school. Bishop Michael's wife, Julia, is involved with the women's work caring for refugees and children. Bishop Michael stressed the importance he places in building both interdenominational and interfaith links across his Diocese. More information can be found at <https://cypgulf.org>.

His talk concluded with Q&As before our own Bishop Rachel, as Festival Patron, came to greet Bishop Michael and thank him for his participation in the Festival.

QUIRKY SAINTS

ST BERNARD OF MENTHON *Saints Day 15 June*

Bernard was born to a noble family in Savoy in around 1020. When he reached adult-hood his father arranged an unwelcome marriage and in popular legend it is said that he had to sneak out of the castle on the night before his wedding, and that during his flight he threw himself from his window, only to be caught by angels and lowered gently to the ground 40 feet below.

He ran away to Italy placing himself under the direction of the Archdeacon of Aosta, under whose guidance he rapidly progressed, becoming a priest and seeing the old pagan ways still prevailing among the people of the Alps, Bernard was called to devote himself to their conversion, effecting numerous conversions and working many miracles. Bernard became archdeacon and had the charge of caring for the poor and travelers. For their convenience and protection, he founded the highest monastery in the world at the pass which has come to bear his name. A few years later he established another hostel on the Little St Bernard Pass.



At all seasons of the year, but especially during heavy snow storms, the canons, later accompanied by their well-trained dogs, went out in search of victims who might have succumbed to the severity of the weather. St. Bernard dogs are still on the site as pets; helicopters are used in rescue operations today. St. Bernard is patron

saint of snowboarders, skiers, mountaineers and hikers

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An Imaginative Prayer: Pentecost

This imaginative prayer meditation is based on Acts 2:1–11, the story of the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost.

After Jesus ascended to the Father, all of us who followed him decided to stay together. He told us to wait for the Holy Spirit. We weren't sure what that meant, really. What would it look like, feel like? The Holy Spirit visited the prophets in strange ways—in visions, with powerful speech, even with great miracles.

In Jesus' company, we had indeed witnessed miracles. We told stories, often, of when he healed this person or cast out a demon from that one. We recounted the story of Jesus feeding thousands with a few loaves and fishes. The biggest miracle, of course, was his Resurrection. That was more than a miracle; it changed the world forever. It changed us, down to our very bones and breath.

What do I remember most fondly about traveling with Jesus? Was it his stories? He had a story for just about every situation! Was it the way he looked with great kindness on a person, no matter who that person was or what he'd done?

All we could do now was tell stories of what had already happened — that and pray. We prayed as Jesus had taught us. And we waited.

What are we waiting for? How will we know that the Advocate has come to us? Will we know for certain, or will it be another one of Jesus' puzzles or parables?

The Feast of Pentecost arrived, and still we remained gathered like sheep awaiting the shepherd. We observed our Pentecost prayers and rituals, continuing to act like the observant Jews we were. But something was missing, and we didn't even know how to describe it.

What does a community need, when it has understood a new and revolutionary truth?

Do we need better understanding? Do we need a plan?

Do we need, more than anything, the courage to keep believing and telling what we know?

On the Feast of Pentecost, while we prayed together, the room suddenly filled with wind that seemed to come from an ocean or a desert. Or a cave or mountain. It was fresh and cool yet weighted with unnameable fragrance and crackling like fire. The two small windows and the seemingly calm weather outside could not account for this roaring, invisible, electric rush of air.



What is happening? Are we to be taken up in a whirlwind, as Elijah was? Will we go now to be with our Lord, wherever he is?

We prayed louder and with urgency. Surely God would protect us from whatever was happening just now. At one point all of us were saying, together, the prayer Jesus had taught us: “Our Father . . .”

Then our communal prayer burst into a hundred prayers at once. Our words had begun in unison but now reproduced themselves in odd yet fervent lines of syllables. After a few moments, we realized that we were not saying the same words. In fact, we were not even speaking the same language.

What is going on in my mouth? I think a thought, and my tongue and lips form the thought on their own, in words I cannot perceive yet know to be true.

Each one of us was praying in an excited voice, in a distinct language. And we were proclaiming this new story of the risen Christ with eloquence we could not have imagined moments before. With our minds we could not translate, but our hearts knew exactly what we meant.

Who's knocking on the door? Oh—they've pushed it open, and there's a crowd out there! Who are they, and what do they want? They seem to be foreigners, judging by their clothes.

We stopped praying so that the people out in the street, now in our doorway, could be heard. "How is that you Galileans are speaking all our languages, telling us of God's mighty works? We're from a dozen different countries and tongues, and yet you speak to us plainly. What's going on here?"

Then Peter stood on a table and began to tell the story.

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We Could Use a Little Spirit Today

When I was a young boy growing up, we still used the name “Holy Ghost”. Of course, most of us at that age are fascinated by ghosts to begin with, and popular at the time was the cartoon “Caspar the Friendly Ghost”. Beyond that, all of us are afraid of the dark, a place where ghosts and goblins seem to inhabit in our young minds. So, here we are. I am no longer a child, and now we say “Holy Spirit” instead of “Holy Ghost”. Actually, “spirit” is more accurate and captures what we mean better. It comes from the Hebrew noun “rauch”, translated into English as “spirit, breath, or wind”. It’s an amorphous term that cannot be described as much as it can be experienced.

I believe you can find people with great spirit in life. I also believe that there is something called “the spiritual dimension” that all of us have as part of our human make-up. However, sometimes our spirits are flat or deflated. Sometimes we have lost an essential part of ourself when we lose our spirit.

The church was born on the Day of Pentecost. However, you want to describe it, you have to say, it was a happening of the Holy Spirit. New life was breathed into the early apostles. Life that was transforming and empowering. It has been described as a wind, as tongues of fire, but in the end, it was the inspiration of the risen Christ, who gives us the spirit of service, the spirit of love, and the spirit of new life.

While the church at times looks like it’s lacking any spirit, dragging its way from one boring thing to another, it is my hope that, as we gather this Pentecost Sunday, we pray for God’s Holy Spirit to enter into our life and empower us to continue to do great things.
