News from The Hermitage

Dear Friends

This month, the bulk of my article contains my chaplains' report for our Annual Church Meeting, 2017. As I write I am mindful of the verse from Philippians 3: 13 & 14 where Paul writes: "forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, I press on towards the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus". As we look back on all St Andrew's community has done over the past years we give thanks for the people who have served in this place and developed witness and ministry according to their vision and talents and time, clergy and laity together. When I lead the intercessory prayers, mostly at 8am or Thursday mornings, I almost always remember these people with gratitude, then, I turn to lifting up those who are standing in the gap now. It is now our turn for picking up the baton to run our leg of the relay race. What we do now does not decry or undermine what has gone before; it develops and leads following a day exploring our it forward. An Annual Church

Meeting is the summing up of the past calendar year in many aspects of the church life. We ask people to submit reports and review what we have achieved, and lay out some vision for the future. All too often meetings can be a bit of a drag, sometimes meetings may be dogged by bad tempers, on Sundays people want to get away to lunch appointments. This has led me to consider that the ACM should be a real event in the church's year to look forward to, something to be celebrated. Evaluating our life together and looking at how we move forward should always be a priority for all of, so next year we will make it an evening event, followed by drinks and nibbles, and hope that many will re-think the church ACM in much the same way as we have re-thought giving, or other social events, such as the Harvest Festival, the Advent Fayre, the Pancake Supper, not as separate to our other worshipping church life together, but intrinsic to it.

For now we will concentrate on the review of this past year, and how guickly another year rolls around! In 2016, we held our ACM experimentally, on a Saturday, "Welcome" as a church, which

was based on the project developed by Lichfield diocese. Putting much of the results into practice this year has seen a tide change in the atmosphere and vibrancy of St Andrew's and we are very much encouraged by lots of mail and correspondence we get thanking us for the warmth of our welcome. Several new initiatives have taken place. I was delighted with the introduction to CAP, "Christians Against Poverty", by one of the older members of our church community who has become passionate about this work in the UK. It causes us to think about how we respond to those living in poverty here and resulted in concern for some of our students who find themselves in verv difficult circumstances. A very generous gift made it possible to provide a meal on the Friday before Advent Sunday when 50 students ate together and we listened to their tales of being lured here under false pretences. We are delighted to see many students integrated into the life of St Andrew's ministry, and the success of the food bank, called "Marvellous" after one young lady who was lost and sleeping in church but taken up but loving members of our congregation.

The diocesan theme of "Intentional Discipleship" is something I have felt is showing fruit in St Andrew's in the many different aspects of church ministry development. We are re-thinking a lot about why we do what we do and how that affects what we do and how we do it. Our Christmas fayre is one such example of this. We held it on a Sunday (Advent Sunday, and we should really have called it our Advent Fayre!) so that it is not understood as a "fundraiser" but as an expression of our worshipping life together, inviting members of the wider community to join with us, first in worship and then reaching out to the wider community. We had wonderful food stalls and many extra stall holders invited. As a church we have to re-think our giving, not as a business, making money to store up, but to develop ministry.

Even the terrible weather conditions over Christmas did not put off people marking Christmas, despite understandably, numbers being down. We had music of the highest quality, with the challenge of integrating visitors and swallows. Kyrenia Chamber choir joined us along with the bishop, in a very fine service of Nine lessons and Carols. One hugely successful project this year has been the launch of "Scene@standrews". This is a way of communicating to the wider world of our ministry and inviting them to share with us in helping it to develop. In my introduction I write: "Here at St Andrew's we are working hard to be a church community that lives condemning violence against out its appreciation of, and awareness of, the goodness, the generosity and the greatness of God. All forms of service. including financial giving, are encouraged and developed on the basis of a response to God's call to us. We want to be at the heart of the community here in Cyprus, serving all, whether residents, visitors, tourists or those who own homes here and come to visit several times each year, often known as "swallows", expressing God's abundant love in all we think and we should feel the fear of the say and do. St Andrew's is a place to think about why we worship God and we hope you will be drawn to share with us in exploring the exciting journey of faith." Please read and share the first publication of Scene@standrews, and digest carefully the many and various ways that we express our ministry here together. Do think how we can develop it, what the Every blessing, skills you have to offer are, and

offer them!! We are now working closely with local groups such as Tulips, networking with local groups, giving us all more opportunities to share our faith at the heart of our local community. I was honoured to be part of the first joint statement of religious leaders on the island women, and we are considering ways in which we might contribute in a practical way to support society. We had a fabulous Pancake supper, once again, inviting many in to share with this way of marking the beginning of Lent. Next year we plan for it to be even bigger with a special early evening pancake race and games for children, using this opportunity once again to teach and share.

My Easter Day message was that risen Christ because God is on the loose here in St Andrew's and we need to become accustomed to expecting the unexpected!

This year as we move ahead together, growing in faith and ministry, whilst comforting those who are disturbed, God may wish to disturb us from our comfortable existence.

MUSIC WEEK 2017 23 - 28 May with NykkÖ-Michaël Grégoire

NykkÖ, an accomplished musician, was born in France in 1979. He studied the organ and piano at the conservatoire in Angoulème and in 1997 moved to the conservatoire of Bordeaux to continue his studies of the organ, harmony and compostion, harpsichord and the "Ondes Martenot" (an early electronic musical instrument invented in 1928 by Maurice Martenot).

He gained his diploma in Music in 2002 and a diploma teaching in 2005.

He has worked extensively as a teacher and an accompanist for choirs, soloists and instrumentalists. He moved to England in September 2009.

Making smiles for children with disabilities

On the outskirts of Cairo, the Shams el Birr centre provides children and adults with disabilities the opportunity of an education and the chance to lead independent lives. With the help of EMBRACE, Shams el Birr was recently able to buy a new dentist chair. Dentists often refuse to treat people with disability and this, coupled with the fact some people with disabilities often are uncomfortable being examined, means that they can struggle to keep their teeth clean.

Many children also suffer poor health due to problems with their teeth, like Panya, who broke her upper teeth as a small child and as a consequence had difficulty chewing.

This had a damaging effect on her health and her happiness. Dental treatment offered at the centre means she can now eat more easily and is happier, often smiling and laughing.


As is Asim who was so self-conscious of his damaged teeth he rarely opened his r



meant he had difficulty making some sounds which affected his speech. Now that he has visited the dentist he is much happier to be examined; his speech is improving and he is much more confident. Shams el Birr is a home to children with disabilities and so much more. Adults with disabilities come to the centre to learn skills like carpentry and weaving and children receive rehabilitation, medical care and educational support, with the aim of getting them into mainstream schools or schools delivering special education. The care and dedication of the staff at Shams el Birr benefits hundreds of people with disabilities each year.



Changing lives in Egypt:

'Without you, we can't develop the village'

BLESS, the social services arm of the Coptic Orthodox Church and partners in rural Egypt with EMBRACE have an exciting vision – a world where they're not needed! By equipping local volunteers to lead improvements in living conditions, economic security and health, and helping communities become self-sufficient for good. Madeleine Davis, Embrace trustee and deputy editor of the Church Times, visited a busy village where independence is taking shape...

Up on a roof in the village of Yasmine, in Egypt's Minya governorate, exists a co-operative fuelled by flour and enthusiasm. On the day we visited we found four women busy at work, skilfully spinning out dough into huge flatbreads, before passing them to a colleague manning a brick oven. The atmosphere was industrious, cheerful and typical of what we found in the village, which is undergoing an impressive transformation.

Yasmine is one of 30 villages currently involved in the community integrated development programme. Identified by the Bishop of the diocese as one of the neediest, there was no school or clinic, and a high level of illiteracy.

'It was very poor and very marginalised,' Hoda, a mother of seven, tells me. The arrival of BLESS changed things.

'We feel very happy because we hadn't any kind of services. Now we have services for each category of the people here.' She lists numerous initiatives including literacy classes, health education, and vocational training 'to improve our economic level'. The approach taken by BLESS impressed her.

'They made a big carnival tent, big enough for involving all the village, and they invited all the people,' she recalls. 'They said "We will not start without you. We want your experiences of the community, and we are here to discover your problems together".'

BLESS's goal is to help communities like Yasmine become selfreliant; to ensure that when the organisation withdraws after five years, the development work doesn't grind to a halt. It achieves this by recruiting and training fieldworkers from within the community. After conducting an assessment of the village's problems, in consultation with the whole community, these fieldworkers create a five-year plan. While BLESS provides monthly funding, covering costs ranging from housing repairs to loans for small businesses, the transformation is powered by local people, many of whom serve as volunteers.

Hoda, who remembers being told *'without you we cannot develop the village*', would like to learn more about health and education and feels passionately about her children's schooling. The project has instilled an understanding of the importance of education, she thinks. *'All the people around me care to send their children to school.'*

Among the young people we met in Yasmine was Maryam. Her father grows vegetables and her brother recently won a Visa to live in the United States, under a lottery programme. Reluctant to follow her sister in marrying a local man, she dreams of being able to leave to market products in the city. On the morning of our visit we find her working as a volunteer at the new nursery. While a small number of the villagers are paid, the majority involved in the project are volunteers, offering ideas, supporting one another, and helping to run community services. Others are running small businesses, aided by new machinery like the flourgrinder that powers the bread co-operative.

BLESS's empowering approach is shared by other Embrace partners in Egypt, where the government is battling with soaring inflation, a plummeting currency, and employment of 12 per cent. It is estimated that in the poorest governorates, more than a third of the population lives below the poverty line of \$2 a day. Against this challenging backdrop, Christians (estimated to number up to 15 per cent of the population) are working alongside poor communities beyond the reach of many government services. A shift is evident, from pure charity to sustainable development, from educating people about their rights and entitlements under Egyptian law, to providing small loans designed to generate a sustainable income.
