

Report on the Annual Meeting of the Friends of the Diocese of Cyprus and the Gulf

On a rather wet morning on the 5th August 2019 members from around the country converged on All Hallows by the Tower for the Annual meeting and were greeted with a warming cup of tea or coffee along with a very warm welcome from the good people of All Hallows and from their new parish Priest, the Revd Katherine Hedderly.

After a good time of catching up and chatting with friends, we had our Annual Meeting, it was good to welcome the Venerable Nick Shutt from the Exeter Diocese and also to hand over a cheque from the "Friends" to Bishop Michael for his work around the diocese. We had a short break for quiet reflection which was followed by the Eucharist with Bishop Michael presiding and the Revd Katherine Hedderly preaching.

As I mentioned previously the team at All Hallows put on an excellent lunch. I am sure everyone who came would like to thank all the people who helped to provide the lunch for us as well as making us so welcome throughout the day. This gave us another opportunity to meet new people as well as renew old acquaintances before dispersing once more into the somewhat wet and gloomy afternoon.

We call the Eucharist on this occasion each year a Celebration Eucharist, and so it is, doubly: a celebration of the Friends and a celebration of the diocese itself. Thank you, Friends, for

everything you do and are. Thank you most of all for your prayerful and imaginative support of the continuing life of the Anglican Diocese of Cyprus and the Gulf.

This year we're privileged not only to be hosted by the Reverend Katherine Hedderly, All Hallows' new vicar, along with colleagues from the congregation of this remarkable church, but also to have her as our preacher. The sooner I sit down, the sooner – after a short interlude – she can stand up.

Meanwhile, it has become almost traditional for me to note the past twelve months' alarms and excursions. Politically the region has become dangerously hot, with President Trump's sabotaging of the nuclear deal that was painstakingly crafted between major western powers and Iran. You don't have to be an admirer of the regime in Tehran to understand its exasperation and fury. And needless tough-guy posturing across the Atlantic has resulted in the dashing of the hopes of ordinary people in Iran that sanctions might be progressively eased as a quid pro quo for moderation of the nuclear development programme.

Ecclesiastically it would be wrong not to mention the enormous disappointment (and more) that was expressed at diocesan synod in February after it was learned that the council of the Epiphany Qatar had apparently persuaded an official government to in the replace nominated and trusted representatives in the running of the Anglican Centre there with names not sanctioned by me. We became aware of that immediately after the departure of Fr Paul Davies as incumbent. The result has been the denial to the wider work of the diocese of a tithe from the Centre, and the takeover by the council of day-to-day management and administration of the Centre's complex life. In Bahrain, I decided to ask Archdeacon Bill Schwartz, hitherto living in Qatar, whether he would agree to be considered for the impending vacant post of Dean, thus take on а second responsibility. I hope I may say that the council in Bahrain, whose consent I sought, welcomed my suggestion with open arms. After due process and an opportune handover by Chris Butt, the outgoing dean, Bill was installed in St Christopher's Cathedral. He is at present on a richly deserved summer break in his native America.

In Iraq St George Baghdad has never been busier. I've been there three times in the last year, including my now customary Holy Week stay with Julia alongside me. On another occasion we were accompanied by Canon Derek and Mrs Sue Smith, late of Limassol. If you haven't seen on the diocesan website the photographs of that and various other happening at St George's, do look. Faiz Jeries carries on energetically developing the Anglican School of the Redeemer, which after this summer will see a further influx of children sent by parents, mostly Muslim, eager for what it provides. It is set to become as respected a local institution as the clinic and the kindergarten. neatly uniformed children are often in demand publicity for shots government ministers. The present Iraqi prime minister, HE Adil Abdul-Mahdi, visited the compound and was duly impressed. I hope to take Faiz to Lambeth Palace to meet the Archbishop of Canterbury and others on 5th November.

Elsewhere in the archdeaconry of the Gulf, Kuwait has seen the opening of a branch of the Mothers' Union led by Mama Christine Mbona, and the Urdu-language congregation there is in the process of having its governance and oversight improved. Abu Dhabi parish continues to include St Thomas Al 'Ain and a dedicated church building, on land already granted, is a real prospect, though work at All Saints Musaffah is presently stalled. What was the Chaplaincy of Dubai and Sharjah with the Northern Emirates has now been disaggregated into four parishes: Martin Sharjah, Holy Trinity Dubai, Christ Church Jebel Ali, and St Luke Ras al Khaimah with St Nicholas Fujairah, with the hope that energies and talent will now be devoted to appropriate local needs and opportunities. In Oman Bill Schwartz and I have cautiously seen a small improvement in relations and conversation between us and the council, and I was pleased over a recent weekend to preach at all four services in Ghala and Ruwi. In the Yemen there is always hope that the misery of war will cease and some sort accommodation will be found between the Hadi government, the Houthis, and other

factions and groupings; meanwhile the work of Christ Church and the clinic at Ras Morbat quietly goes on. Finally, in the kingdom that occupies so much of the Arabian Peninsula, nothing, despite fanfare and promises, seems truly to have altered.

Cyprus has just seen a change of archdeacon: John Holdsworth has in the last few days retired and will move to Wales after nine years' service in Cyprus and the Gulf in several major roles. In the last few years he with others has steered the revision and updating of the diocesan constitution, a process that should be formally completed at the forthcoming synod. I am delighted that John will be to some extent back and forth in the diocese as honorary Director of Ministry for two further, transitional, years to ensure continuity in discerning and fostering vocations and in placing, guiding, and training ordinands, Readers, and others. His successor is Christopher Futcher, who travels to the island with Anne almost straight after today to take up the principal responsibilities of territorial archdeacon and parish priest of Larnaca and also to imbibe some of John's wisdom in ministry and training matters. Anne Futcher, after priestly ministry in Devon Christopher was Archdeacon of Exeter, will serve in a non-stipendiary capacity at St Helena's but also more widely, in particular as our social concern officer.

In Nicosia St Paul's Cathedral celebrated 125 years of the building on its present site; a new window of the patron saint was dedicated. Paphos still sees, at least by British standards, many weddings, though fewer than in earlier years, and the parish maintains three centres of worship across the civil district. St Barnabas Limassol Lazarus also serves St Pissouri. formerly South-East Ammochostos. Cyprus, includes St Mark Famagusta, where both lay and ordained chaplains have offered short periods looking after the mainly student congregation. Finally well attended and Kyrenia, looking

forwards, is soon to advertise for a new incumbent.

In the last twelve-month period I have ordained two priests, Charlotte Lloyd-Evans for Al 'Ain and Abu Dhabi and Navina Thompson for Famagusta and Ammochostos, though Navina is currently back in Abu Dhabi while the next phase of her ministry is pondered. Deacons Justin Arnott and Peter Day, both in Cyprus, will be priested this St Matthew's Day. Reader ministry is steadily increasing across the diocese. A few weeks ago a remarkably successful and intensive summer school was held, by way of in-service and preservice training, at the Near East School of Theology in Beirut, and was attended by invited participants - on the path to public ministry lay and ordained or in its early years - from many parts of the diocese. John Holdsworth as Director of Ministry was responsible for all aspects of planning and delivery.

Ecumenical relations with other Christian Churches and traditions flourish in most A particular friend of mine, Metropolitan Chrysostomos of Kition in Cyprus, has just retired after 46 years as diocesan bishop. I confidently predict I shan't make that, though this year is my twentieth as a bishop and fortieth as a and our fortieth wedding anniversary. On the wider front I continue to be a member of the international Anglican-Orthodox Theological Commission. In the Gulf, church leaders across a wide range of varieties of Christianity meet residentially once a year for a valuable exchange of news and and the sense of common views. enterprise is palpable.

The Al Amana Centre in Oman, where I am now the longest-serving board member, is a fine example of Christian interfaith engagement with Islam, and tribute should be paid to the Reformed Church in America for their vision in establishing it. In Cyprus, Imam Shakir Alemdar of Hala Sultan Tekke near

Larnaca is a gracious and energetic promoter of good Christian-Muslim relations.

Our diocesan companionship links within the Anglican Communion, with Thika in Kenya and Exeter in the Province of Canterbury, are in good shape. We are the partner next due to host a three-way gathering and I hope it may be in the Gulf this time rather than Cyprus, to show our friends the breadth of who and where we are. I myself visited Thika during the year to give talks on interfaith encounter and on liturgy.

Our Province of Jerusalem and the Middle East looks as though it will at some point not too far off be reconfigured. commission established by the Anglican Communion Office will in early autumn consider proposals and details already much debated, though not conclusively, in provincial standing committee in Cairo, in provincial synod in Amman and at a prior meeting of provincial diocesan bishops in Ras al Khaimah. It will especially consider Egypt's strong desire to leave and itself become a Province of several dioceses. Clarity will be needed on how the rest of Jerusalem and the Middle East will and should be, if Egypt goes.

I am to become Primate of the Province on 17th November and we shall mark it, at St Andrew Abu Dhabi as a convenient central location, with a eucharist of prayer and thanksgiving for the Province past, present, and future. There will be plenty of room: all are welcome; and all prayers are needed, wherever you will be.

As a Primate I will continue to be a consultant to one of the finest acronyms in the business, IASCUFO: nothing to do, I have found, with visitors from outer space but rather the Inter-Anglican Standing Committee on Unity, Faith, and Order, where matters both smooth and thorny from outside and inside the Communion are reviewed, debated, and sometimes progressed. Or was I right first guess?

In an inevitably selective report I might also mention a visit by Bill Schwartz and me to Virginia Theological Seminary and the Center for Anglican Communion Studies in the United States, where we set out to convey to fellow Anglicans our unique make-up and our opportunities for We also called on State witness. Department officials and on the staff of politicians, **Democrats** both and Republicans, on Capitol Hill in Washington DC.

Thanks again to this Association of Friends, to office-holders, committee, and everyone here; and, again and finally, to All Hallows, our host.



News from Iraq

New British ambassador visits St George's, Baghdad

Mr Stephen Hickey, recently appointed British ambassador to Iraq, attended the eucharist at St George's on Sunday 8th December 2019.

In discussions with Fr Faiz Jerjes, the parish priest, he referred to the current large-scale popular demonstrations against corruption, which were taking place very close to the church and in other places too, and affirmed the UK's support for religious freedom.

Four New Canons



Faiz, John, Harrison and Chris

Bishop Michael announced that in the autumn he would preside at the installation of four new honorary canons of the Diocese of Cyprus and the Gulf's twin cathedrals, two for St Paul Nicosia and two for St Christopher Bahrain.

Fr Faiz Jerjes has over the course of the years been layman, Reader, deacon, and priest at St George's Baghdad. As well as overseeing the worship and pastoral care of the church and the smooth functioning of the clinic he has masterminded the establishment of a large kindergarten and recently the building of the Al Fadi Anglican primary school. Faiz has been honoured in Iraq for his imaginative initiatives in promoting peace and human flourishing across religions.

The Revd Dr John Holdsworth is a much-published scholar whose substantial service as territorial archdeacon in Cyprus and executive archdeacon for the whole diocese as well as parish priest of St Helena Larnaca and Diocesan Director of Ordinands and Ministry culminates in the summer. He will then serve for two transitional years as Honorary Director of Ministry with a

brief to ensure, with others, the continuity of the vocation, discernment, and ministry project that he has done so much to foster. John previously served with distinction in the Church in Wales including a period as Principal of its theological college. He will be known as Canon Theologian.

The Revd Harrison Chinnakumar currently ministers as parish priest of Holy Trinity Dubai, tirelessly pastoring a large multi-ethnic congregation and watching over one of the busiest compounds in the diocese, hosting huge numbers of guest churches and fellowships. He came to the Gulf from the Church of South India. Before taking on Dubai he was incumbent of the parish of St Paul Kuwait, where Anglican worship is offered in Mandarin and Urdu as well as English and support is often given to Tamil congregations of our sister-Church the CSI.

The Revd Chris Butt was until his recent retirement the highly appreciated Dean of St Christopher's Cathedral in Bahrain, another place with worshippers from many ethnic and national backgrounds. Under Chris's imaginative leadership, frequent Living Room Dialogues brought to the deanery a fascinating range of distinguished thought-provoking and speakers from all walks of life, by no means all Christians, and showed wider society in the Kingdom of Bahrain the openness welcome and that must characterise Anglicanism. Chris brought to Bahrain the fruits of earlier discipleship and ministry in Kenya and Hong Kong as well as England.

Canon Jerjes and Canon Holdsworth were installed in Nicosia on Sunday 3rd November 2019. Canon Butt was installed in Bahrain on Friday 25th October 2019, and Canon Chinnakumar is to be installed there on Saturday 7th March 2020.


Father Jim for Jebel Ali

The next parish priest of Christ Church Jebel Ali in the Emirate of Dubai is the Revd James Young.

Fr Jim served at St Thomas Chesapeake in the Diocese of Southwestern Virginia. He has previously ministered across the USA in Louisiana, Texas, California and Oregon as well as the Commonwealth of Virginia, together with a period as Episcopal chaplain of Stanford University.

Launde Abbey 900 Year Celebration



Launde Abbey

A Brief History of Launde Abbey

Launde Abbey was founded as an Augustinian priory in 1119 by Richard Basset, a royal official of Henry I. During the first century of its life the community buildings, cloister and garth were built, including an imposing church of which one side chapel still survives, now used as the Chapel at the present-day Abbey. Thomas Cromwell, Henry VIII's chief minister responsible for the dissolution of the monasteries, found Launde's location very desirable.

After visiting the priory in April 1540 he wrote in his *Remembrances* (a kind of personal journal) "Myself for Launde,"

although he never occupied the house as he was executed just three months later for treason. His son Gregory, however, had kept royal favour - no doubt helped by his marriage to Elizabeth Seymour, sister to Henry VIII's beloved wife Jane and lived at Launde Abbey with Elizabeth for ten years; during this time he had dilapidated the of monastic buildings restored or rebuilt. Gregory was buried at Launde and a monument erected by his wife remains in the Chapel to this day.

On the Saturday it was lovely sunshine and a chance of some free time to paruse the Craft Stalls or partake of some food from the outdoor vendors.

During the afternoon we signed up for a walking tour through the local woodland area surrounding Launde, this was lead by a member of the Leistershire Forestry Commission. The walk wound its way through the woods where we learned about the history of the forests of the area during centuries.

Saturday evening we were seated for a formal dinner, in a huge marquee erected on the lawn between the house and stables.

The entertainment for the evening was a look the life of Thomas Cromwell, as follows:

Life of Thomas Cromwell

As part of the 900 year celebrations, attendees were treated to a fascinating talk held by historian Diarmaid MacCulloch, and Booker Prize winning novelist, Hilary Mantel. Both speakers enthralled an audience of 320 people as they opened a window on the life of Thomas Cromwell, with his huge significance for Henry VIII's England and particular connection with Launde Abbey.

The event was introduced and moderated by the Bishop of Brixworth, the Rt Revd John Holbrook.

The Historian and Novelist brought contrasting but complementary perspectives, and it was fascinating to hear extracts relating to Launde from Hilary's as yet unpublished third novel, The Mirror and the Light. Without creating any spoilers, in her imagination, Launde had clearly worked its way into Cromwell's mind, just as it continues to do for many visitors today.

The Cromwell family lived at Launde until the end of the 16th century and then, for the next three centuries, the house passed through the hands of various owners: the Smiths (who probably began the process of dismantling the original monastery and building the present manor house), followed by the Halfords, Clarkes, Simpsons and Dawsons. This latter family engaged Thomas Rickman to embark on an extensive restoration of the house in the mid nineteenth century.

In 1957 the prominent Leicestershire businessman Cecil Coleman, together with his wife Lilian, purchased the abbey and presented it to the Diocese of Leicester. They also paid for the conversion works to make it into a retreat house.

Obituaries

Trevor Sait 1936 - 2019

Trev (not Trevor please) was born on 5th March 1936 in Sutton, Surrey, after he left school he did a five year apprenticeship as a jig and tool maker before being called up, National Service, into the RAF where he served, having signed on as a regular, for 30 years and 131 days.

During his service career he spent 14 years overseas in Cyprus, Hong Kong, Singapore, Germany and Malaysia. While in Malaysia he took up road running and completed the Penang International Marathon in 4 hours. 21 minutes and 24 seconds having taken 3 months going from no running at all to completing the marathon; his other most notable sporting achievement, while in Malaysia, was climbing Mount Kinabalu at 4,095m the highest mountain in Malaysia. On return to the UK he was posted to RAF Prestwick where he stayed until he retired from the RAF. He then did various jobs until he got a job as a MOD civil servant which he did until he finished work at age 60.

During his time in Scotland he started attending the Church of Scotland although, as he would have said as a 'churchgoer' without getting particularly involved in church life.

On retiring to Cyprus on 6th September 1995, he attended Ayia Kyriaki church in Paphos and gradually started getting involved in church life, his first 'job' was one of the team of pallbearers, he then went on to being a Sacristan and from there (after much soul searching and persuasion from others) to studying for the Reader Ministry; he was admitted to the Office of Reader on 2nd May 2004 by Bishop Clive Handford then, on 1st April 2010, he was given, by Bishop Michael Lewis, Permission to Officiate as a Reader within the Diocese of Cyprus and the Gulf.

He first attended Diocesan Synod in 1996, having been persuaded by friends in Paphos that it was an event well worth going to, then attended every year except for the year that Synod was held in the Gulf, in 2006 he was asked by Steve Collis, then Provost of the Cathedral, if he would be Sacristan at the Synod he said yes and from then on was Sacristan every year until 2018 when he felt he was getting to the point where he wasn't sure he could do things properly and well and decided it was time to hand over to someone younger.

He enjoyed his time as a Reader and his involvement with the Diocese all of which he considered an honour and a privilege. May he rest in peace and rise in glory!


